- compare and contrast the opposing ideas
- explain how these articles relate to topics or readings from the course -- this is VERY important so try to choose your articles/topics with this aspect of the assignment in mind. The books covered in this course are:

What's wrong with this picture? A congressional study says that women who work full time earn on average 20 percent less than men. "It seems that still, at the root of it all, men get an inherent annual bonus just for being men," says Democratic Rep. Carolyn Maloney. "If this continues, the only guarantees in life will be death, taxes, and the glass ceiling." Among other findings of the General Accounting Office report: Men with children make 2 percent more than guys without kids, while women with children make 2.5 percent less than women without them. Maloney and Rep. John Dingell plan legislation to establish a center to study the issue.

"The pay gap is real, it is persistent, and it is costing hardworking families thousands of dollars annually," says Dingell. "The price of a family should not be a woman's career." Indeed.
